Dear Leader Schumer, Minority Leader McConnell, Chair Murray, Vice Chair Collins, Speaker Johnson, Leader Jeffries, Chairman Cole, and Ranking Member DeLauro,

We write to you today as the undersigned coalition of 132 organizations, businesses, and allies including public health professionals, community associations, think tanks, land trusts, floodplain managers, conservation districts, waterkeepers, rural voices, farm workers, and more, calling on Congress to expedite the passage of an emergency supplemental appropriations bill. Additionally funding is necessary to help families, businesses, and already devastated communities get back on their feet.

On September 26th, 2024 Hurricane Helene made landfall on Florida's Gulf Coast as a Category 4 storm which made its way across Georgia, the Carolinas, and Tennessee. Less than two weeks later, on October 9th, 2024, Hurricane Milton hit Florida as a Category 3 hurricane. By some estimates nearly 100,000 farms were in the direct path of the hurricanes. Collectively, these extreme weather events have amassed nearly \$300 billion in damages causing widespread agricultural issues, economic hardship, and infrastructure concerns. To date, 261 people have lost their lives resulting from both hurricanes.

As we work to help rebuild the Southeast with resilience in mind, we urge Congress to approve immediate funding for the programs below which builds on and supports the White House request:

- \$40 billion for the Disaster Relief Fund to support FEMA's response to Hurricanes Helene and Milton:
- \$1.1 billion for the Emergency Watershed Protection Program with report language directing prioritization of activities that enhance long-term river processes rather than short-term fixes.; and
- \$3 billion for State and Tribal Assistance Grants to go to affected States and Tribes to adopt long-term water system upgrades and mitigate damages.

Additionally, the federal funding recommendations below are necessary to support the recovery for the region and prepare for future storms in North Carolina:

- \$100 million for U.S. Army Corps' Environmental Infrastructure Program to assess dams;
- \$35 million for EPA's 319 program to support the implementation of gray water systems;
- \$42 million to AmeriCorps to support the development of regional stream debris removal teams:
- \$35 million for U.S. Forest Services' Dam Engineering and Management Program to support the assessment and removal of dams within their boundaries;
- \$50 million for the National Fish Passage Program to facilitate fish migration and retrofit, rehabilitate, and/or remove dams where they no longer serve a purpose;
- \$24 million for the National Dam Safety Program's State Assistance Program to provide states financial assistance to strengthen dam safety.

Pre- and Post-Disaster Policy Solutions

The following mitigation policies offer a significant downpayment that will help bolster both current and future federal resilience capabilities in a smart and efficient manner.

- Congress should address the White House administration request to forgive all or some
  of the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) debt to ensure policyholders and
  disaster survivors receive the assistance necessary after a flood..
- Congress needs to reauthorize FEMA's National Dam Safety Program and eliminate barriers that often prevent communities from accessing assistance.
- Congress should require FEMA and HUD to better integrate programs for affordable housing with healthy floodplain management to meet the housing needs of families and communities who need to relocate to safer ground.

Thank you for your consideration and we look forward to working with Congress in a bipartisan fashion to help communities recover from recent disasters and ensure that the policies and support are in place to prepare for future disasters.

We stand ready to work with you and your respective committees to pass significant disaster relief so that the road to long term recovery can begin sooner than later. Our communities do not have the luxury of waiting any longer. They need help now.
